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President's foreword

Welcome to the 128th Annual Exhibition of the Royal Society of Portrait Painters. We received well over 2,000 entries this year, the best of which we selected for the show, which encompasses a wide cross section of styles and treatments, with talent and hard work common to each and every exhibit.

Our exhibition takes place annually, as if by clockwork, making it easy to take it for granted, although, of course, it all depends on new artists coming forward and dedicating themselves to painting portraits. However, artists cannot operate alone they need help along the way: people willing to sit, spend time, take an interest in the fundamentals of painting, participate, give constructive criticism, and treat the practice with the appreciation it deserves. To artists and public alike, I say thank you. To both, our exhibition offers the opportunity to see an artist's work in the company of (many) others, and to take note of variances in sizes, colour and actual paint. Social media, such as Instagram, has enabled the incredible dissemination of images, but it is important to see the 'real thing': to remember that artworks are solid physical objects, often large and arresting, not simply backlit pieces of plastic the size of a postage stamp.

This year, there are a number of interesting initiatives to keep our exhibition lively and innovative. We're pleased to continue with our £2,000 prize, The RP Award, which is themed 'Skin' this year. Needless to say, I look forward to seeing which work the judges choose. Likewise our other awards, to whose donors we are most grateful: Sir Christopher Ondaatje, The de Laszlo Foundation, HRH The Prince of Wales, Burke's Peerage Foundation, Smallwood

Architects and the Contemporary Arts Trust. Congratulations to all the prize winners last year, and good luck to everyone this year.

Following last year when we invited four London art schools to send work by promising students, we have invited five Scottish art schools to do the same this year. Scotland has a strong and individual artistic tradition, which we're delighted to represent in our show. There will be several free painting demonstrations by some of the Society's members in the gallery, too – please see our website for fuller details.

This year, the Watts Gallery, Surrey, are kindly lending a portrait of Lillie Langtry by

George Frederic Watts (1817-1904). To coincide with the loan, there will be a talk during our exhibition, which promises to shed light on Watts, celebrated and popular portrait painter and past Honorary Member of this Society.

In 2020, the Royal Society of Portrait Painters will stage an exhibition at the Watts Gallery to coincide with their show about another past member, Sir William Orpen, the Society's President between 1924 and 1930.

It is with sadness that I note the passing of four members since our exhibition last year, Leonard McComb, Michael Noakes, Jason Sullivan, and very recently, Jason Bowyer, in his case, at no great age. We extend our sympathy to their families, and remember the artists and their work with fondess.

Outside of our Annual Exhibition, the permanent collection of People's Portraits at Girton College, Cambridge, continues to grow as a very impressive display of work by leading portrait painters of the last two decades. Girton looks after the collection and hosts an event every September when new pictures are welcomed. We are very grateful to the College and its Mistress, Professor Susan J Smith, for their continued support.

On behalf of the Society, I do hope that you enjoy our exhibition. Please put the word around and encourage your friends to visit our celebration of the very best portraiture nationally and internationally.

The Royal Society and Scottish art schools

This year, the Royal Society of Portrait Painters has invited five Scottish art schools to nominate one student each for inclusion in this year's exhibition. Based in Scotland, RP member, Mark Roscoe, discusses the initiative.

The following artists have been invited: Nefeli Chrysanthou, by Gray's School of Art, Aberdeen; Li Huang, by Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art & Design, University of Dundee; Oliver Jones, by the Edinburgh Atelier of Fine Art; Lorena Levi, by Edinburgh College of Art; and Matthew Manao, by The Glasgow School of Art.

Great Britain has a strong tradition of portrait painting, due in part to the existence of the monarchy and aristocracy, which gave artists the opportunity to earn a living by painting their King or Queen, or members of the noble class – it was seen as a way to

raise their own social standing somewhat. Born in 1587. George Jamesone was possibly Scotland's first eminent portrait painter. who was said to have studied under Rubens in Antwerp with Anthony van Dyck. More than a century later, we were given Sir Henry Raeburn of the Romantic era, who served as a portrait painter to King George IV. David Wilkie was another eminent artist of the time, and was Principal Painter in Ordinary to King William IV and Queen Victoria. There was also James Guthrie and Sir James Gunn from the early twentieth century, right up to the present day where Jenny Saville, Ken Currie and Stephen Conroy have enjoyed success. The various art movements from the twentieth century such as Cubism, Expressionism, Surrealism

and Pop Art began to influence our artists, and we saw an explosion in the variety of painting styles. This change coincided with a different appetite from the general public, and having your portrait painted was no longer perceived as the reserve of the monarchy or the nobility.

Periods of history pass, the names of the artists change, as does the popular style of the time; but one thing has remained the same for centuries, and that is the need for British artists to be connected in some way to London. Nearly all of the artists above, have, at one point, either travelled to, lived in, or exhibited in London. The National Gallery, Tate Britain, the National Portrait Gallery, The British Museum, countless prestigious commercial galleries and (the most important of all) the Royal Society of Portrait Painters, are all based in London.

We are fortunate that we live in a wellconnected society with internet access and a good transport system, but it remains difficult and expensive to transport (often large) paintings thousands of miles up and down the country. Each year, I have to hire transit vans to collect and deliver work, book trains to attend meetings, sittings, unveiling ceremonies, exhibitions, and pay for hotel accommodation. It does become easier when you become established and when you love your job, as I do, but it would be a tragedy if the difficulty or the expense prevented the next big name from getting started. With the Society covering the transport cost of the nominated works this year, hopefully, we will have given a few artists a leg up and a little taste of the world of professional portrait painting.

The People's Portraits Collection at Girton College

The People's Portraits reflect a cross-section of people's lives in the United Kingdom throughout the 21st Century, and is rich in its diversity of subjects and styles.

All of the artists are members of the Royal Society of Portrait Painters, which makes it one of the UK's hidden jewels in the portraiture world.

The Collection chimes well with the College's ethos of inclusion and diversity.

During this, its 150th Anniversary year, Girton welcomes visitors from all walks of life to view the exhibition. The exhibition is open daily 9am – 5pm and admission is free. Families are welcome.



We were shocked and saddened to learn of Jason's sudden passing on 17 February this year. Jason was elected to the RP in 2006, became a member of The Pastel Society in 2004, and served as President of the New English Art Club between 2008 and 2013. With his family's kind permission, we are honoured to exhibit three of Jason's final portraits: the full-size figure of punk rock musician "Rat Scabies" (which took 18 three-hour sessions to complete), a smaller ink drawing of Rat, and a head and shoulders portrait of Paul Oppé. Paul has sat for Jason before as the subject of a charcoal drawing exhibited at last year's Annual Exhibition and part of the artist's "Gentle Men" series. To those of us that knew Jason, it was little surprise that he was drawn to such subjects – he was a gentle soul himself, but with a strength of personality destined to be remembered thanks to his sense of humour, debonair style, and oh yes, that voice...







Emilie Charlotte Langtry (nee Le Breton 1853-1929) was a Jersey born socialite and actress. Famed for her beauty, she was nicknamed Lillie because of her pale white skin.

On moving to London in 1879, Lillie attracted great interest and soon modelled for Edward Burne-Jones, Millais, Frank Miles, Edward Poynter and Val Prinsep. James McNeill Whistler became one of her first promoters, as did a young Oscar Wilde with his poem 'The New Helen'. Another reason for her elevation to public adoration and notoriety was her affair with the Prince of Wales (1841-1910). Lillie personified the cult of beauty associated with the Aesthetic movement and in addition to posing for painters, she was the subject of photographic postcards featuring 'professional beauties' of the day. These 'pin-ups' later became the inspiration for Pete Townshend of 'The Who' to write 'Pictures of Lily' in 1967.

Beyond her life as a 'professional beauty', Lillie became a successful actress and eventually ran her own stage production company, and, in later life, performed in Vaudeville.

Watts invited Lillie to sit in the autumn of 1879 when she was at the height of her fame. When she came to his studio, Watts removed an ostrich feather from her hat because he objected to the unnecessary killing of birds for the fashion trade. The painting of her face is one of the most delicate passages in any of his portraits. Watts became good friends with Lillie and probably never intended to sell the portrait, and it remained in his private collection until his death.

It was exhibited at the Royal Society of Portrait Painters annual exhibition in 1892, and after 127 years, we are privileged to be exhibiting this portrait once again.
